



1. Over-the-counter cough and cold medicines 2. Xanax, Valium, other benzodiazepines 3. Powder, freebase.

## Random facts

- In the 2010 survey, ecstasy provided one of the most recent surges in the use of an illicit drug. Use rose in all grades, significantly so in 8th and 10th...and perceived risk has been falling steadily since 2005.
- It's not only illegal drugs inhalant use is also significant. Inhalants include items like glue, nail polish remover, gasoline, solvents, butane and propellants used in certain commercial products such as whipped cream dispensers. 8th graders use more than most grades at 8.1%.

- Recently headline maker Salvia has made some inroads – 5.5% of seniors have used it during the past 12 months, as did 3.7% of 10th graders and 1.7% of 8th graders.



**Sources:** Monitoring the Future (MTF) is an ongoing study since 1975 of the behaviors, attitudes, and values of American secondary school students. The 2010 MTF survey encompassed about 46,500 eighth-, 10th-, and 12th-grade students in almost 400 secondary schools nationwide. The MTF Study has been funded under a series of investigator-initiated competing research grants from the National Institute on Drug Abuse, a part of the National Institutes of Health.
